Lou Ann Stories

With the past month (July 20th, 1969) being the 50th anniversary of the moon landing, I must tell you a story that is close to home for me. My mother, Bobbie Sutphin, was a reporter for the Baytown Sun for many years and was the Women's Editor and Photographer during that era. She lobbied the owner of the paper for her and fellow reporter Wanda Orton to go cover the story for the Sun even though it was a time when women reporters hardly went on top assignments and were relegated to women's stories around town. Well she and Wanda convinced Fred Hartman (Editor/Owner) of the Baytown Sun (yes, the same one the Bridge is named after) to allow them to cover the story. And...they took off to be a part of that historic event. She told of meeting Dan Rather and Walter Cronkite and other famous reporters who were there from all over the world. She thought she and Wanda (Wanda would later become the Managing Editor of the Sun) were perhaps the only women reporters there.

She would tell us about many stories as they were happening as if we had a front row seat to the event. She told us things like the astronauts could not get life insurance to cover them should they die during the mission and how cover letters with the postage and date were all signed by the astronauts in case they didn't come back for their families to sell to help them get through financially and get their kids through college.

She told of how worried people were and how scary it was when they lost contact with the astronauts as they were on the other side of the moon. Some people in Mission Control believed it might happen and some didn't and about how happy everyone was and Mission Control cheered when they heard back from them. So everything was a first.

Many people in the Mission Control room used slide rulers and while new IBM computers that took up a huge area were newly installed, no one really trusted them to be accurate and in fact they were not as accurate as human calculations. She told stories of how, at first, Dan Rather thought she and Wanda were hostesses of the press room until Mom set him straight. She said Rather was a bit of a flirt but nice and Cronkite was very smart and very funny. She said he was a true gentleman to everyone and spoke about the difficulties of live broadcast and his toughest moment in broadcasting which was, according to him, announcing President John F. Kennedy's assassination. He knew newsmen were not supposed to cry or show emotion but that was a dark day in history that he hoped would never happen again.

She spoke of how fascinating it all was and how they all were in awe and cheered when the first steps were taken. She spoke of things like they were not sure the surface of the moon would actually hold the lunar Module, that was piloted by Buz Aldrin and the first actual words said once they landed and before they got out of the module were something like, "Stop engines now," spoken by Buz Aldrin. I think it must have been Buz that said, "The Eagle has landed." Then once they landed safely, there was some concern about the surface and how it would be or react to their suits or what it was actually made of. At first they were scheduled to take a nap, once they landed on the moon, but they didn't want to do that and had to ask Mission Control for permission to skip their nap and get out there. Mission Control agreed and Neil Armstrong, the Commander, was the first to step out of the lunar Module they named, "The Eagle" and say those famous words that we are all so familiar with. They also placed a placard on the moon that they came in peace for all mankind and the astronauts names were on that plaque as well as Richard Nixon's name. Mom was impressed that President Nixon was actually onboard the ship that picked up the astronauts from the ocean. They stayed in quarantine for 21 days as I recall and no one had contact with them as they were in protective suits the entire time and in a capsule like vessel because NASA wanted to make sure they didn't contaminate the earth with something we didn't know about. I remember that Mom told us that the astronauts could somehow smell the moon's surface and they reported it smelled something like burned gunpowder and was fairly a strong odor. It was like something they had not smelled before they remarked but that was the closest thing they said they could think it smelled like.

She said at one time, they almost didn't make it back to earth when Buzz accidentally broke a circuit breaker switch on the lunar module that was an important switch and would be the difference of getting off the moon and even then there were no guarantees

anyway that they could get off the moon and catch up with the orbiting space craft that Collins was piloting while Neil and Buzz were on the moon. Neil just picked up a felt tip pen (they had to use felt tip pens because the lack of gravity would not allow the ink to work in regular pens) and Neil just shoved that pen into the hole in the circuit breaker and it worked to everyone's relief and amazement. She said again Mission Control cheered.

As they were trying to land back on earth, they had some other problems and some of the systems failed, Mission Control was going crazy buzzing about trying to help them get back safely and Neil had to land it manually with only seconds of fuel left. The computer he had on board was not even as powerful as some of our present day calculators and certainly our cell phones are much more computer power than they ever had.

Later, Mom would learn that President Nixon had a speech already written if something disastrous happened. And that the President himself would call the wives of the astronauts. It was determined that if something happened and the astronauts could not return to Earth, Mission Control would discontinue communication at some point. The astronauts knew this going into the mission and it was a chance they all were willing to take in the name of science and exploration and for the good of mankind.

They brought back just under 50 pounds of moon rock and samples and they left artifacts on the moon. Other than the flag and plaque of peace, they left a mirror for lasers to determine the distance of the moon at all times. And they left an interesting artifact about the size of a half dollar that was a silicon disc that carried the names of Congress, the four committees of the House and Senate responsible for legislation related to NASA, NASA's top administrators and messages from the leaders of 73 countries from around the world. At the top of the disc is the inscription, "Goodwill messages from around the world brought to the moon by the astronauts of Apollo 11" and around the rim is the inscription, "From Planet Earth---July 1969." The disc rests in an aluminum case on the Moon's Sea of Tranquility. It is inspiring and refreshing to know and now remember again that 73 world leaders came together to send a message of goodwill. At the time I just thought it was a nice thing to do, today, I think of all the differences we have with other nations and wish for a better future for us all and messages of goodwill for all of mankind and how in reality we are all very much alike in so many ways. I have a copy of those messages if you would like to see them. They are inspiring and humbling to read.

Mom also spoke of the many conversations between Mission Control and the astronauts and how they would play funny music to wake them up in the morning, like a joke, and how the astronauts would joke back. She also spoke of how knowledgeable and professional everyone was and how sometimes it was both scary and amazing the scope of what was happening. She spoke of concern for once they landed what they would land on and if it would actually be solid enough to support the capsule or if it would sink and also there was some concern about the capsule making it back to the main part where one astronaut was left alone to handle things. There were so many unknowns and she thought the astronauts were very brave and they would also allow their wives to speak with them and she said that was sometimes funny because Mission Control guys would tease the astronauts a little about it. She said that the people on Mission Control had backups and their backups had backups in case someone got sick or if they needed to go to the bathroom. Each person on Mission Control had others that could help him if he needed it on his team and those people were not sitting in the room. She did notice that there were no females in Mission Control that she knew of and she was not happy about that at all. She thought the people on Mission Control were very brave and hardworking. She said they were as brave as the astronauts because one mistake could be fatal, one miscalculation could be catastrophic, so she hailed Mission Control as the unsung heroes of the endeavor. She said it was very tiring because she didn't want to leave for fear of missing something important to report. So she and Wanda put in some long hours both at NASA, calling stories into the newsroom as they were happening and before the teletype machines could print them, and at the typewriter getting more stories out ASAP. They wrote them up in notes on smallish lined notebook pad that flipped open at the top. She would type and cut and paste and edit by actually cutting with scissors and gluing with paste. There were no word processors at the time.

Once she had the stories they went to the editor for editing them to the typesetters to set the type then that all went onto an aluminum plate that was etched into the aluminum and then that plate was put onto rolling store drums that rotated around to pick up ink and roll onto the paper that would feed from giant rolls of paper and literally the presses would roll. Then the machines would cut the page. The pages would all come together and would end up folded in the middle and folded again to reveal the top of the front page and would be stacked and bundled like that. The paper boys or paper delivery people would receive them in a bundle tied up by string and would have to roll them as part of their job before they threw them to homes.

In retrospect, I have been blessed to know people on Mission Control, astronaut Charlie Dry who worked with the original astronauts, our own Charlie Medellin who worked at NASA during this time and for many years thereafter, and many other support people that I can call my friends. I will say they are all special people who are dedicated souls who possess a special calling to be a part of each mission. I also applaud the newspaper reporters, writers and people dedicated to work long hours to bring great stories of courage and perseverance. Real people who forge new frontiers...and go where no men have gone before. And of course, I applaud those brave souls who have vision, dreams and beliefs and step forward to take great risks to bring about changes for the betterment of mankind.

The City of Pasadena **Transportation RIDES** Program



TRANSPORTATION

What is Transportation **RIDES**? How to apply?

Transportation RIDES program provides non-emergency transportation services to qualified extremely low to moderate income* seniors(65+ years) and/or people with disabilities (18-64 years) who reside in Pasadena and who are not able to drive themselves, do not own a vehicle, or medically/physically unable to drive. **Transportation RIDES** helps them find the transportation they need for travel to essential medical services, grocery shopping, errands, social activities as well as for other needs. If eligible, a participant may receive monthly **RIDES** program funds (\$75 per month) that may be used with any of the designated transportation providers.

Transportation RIDES is funded in part by the City of Pasadena Community Development Block Grant Program through the Madison Jobe Senior Center/Parks & Rec. and is limited to Community Development Department's available funds.

- Copy of valid DL or ID card with picture
- Completed Disability Statement (if the applicant has a disability and is between the ages of 18 to 64)
