The TPCA, founded in 1958, is dedicated to promoting, encouraging, and advancing the professional development of Chiefs of Police and senior police management personnel across Texas.


As a statewide law enforcement administrator’s organization, TPCA addresses critical issues within the criminal justice system both locally and at the state legislature.






BY RACE / ETHNICITY



BY SEX













The Patrol Operations Division provides round-the-clock emergency and non-emergency response services throughout the year. Their daily activities encompass law enforcement, proactive patrols, citizen assistance, vehicle collision investigations, and apprehending fugitives with active warrants. The division is structured into three uniformed patrol shifts, each commanded by a lieutenant supported by several sergeants and numerous police officers. This organization ensures continuous coverage and efficient day-to-day operations, forming the backbone of the department's public safety and law enforcement efforts.

CANINE UNIT



The K9 unit, led by Sergeant C. Wilkerson, comprises five officers and their canine partners. They support various divisions in suspect apprehension, narcotics detection, and related financial investigations. The unit also assists with warrant services and participates in community events as needed.

The Pasadena Bicycle Patrol Division proactively patrols the city to locate, stop, and prevent crime while also engaging with the community to improve and build strong bonds with our citizens. The unit specializes in being a versatile resource that can aid various divisions in their missions while possessing the ability to be highly visible or extremely discrete depending on what is needed. Bicycle Patrol can safely and effectively operate both over large expansive areas or in small crowded areas where it may be difficult for patrol vehicle or foot patrol to effectively function, as they have enhanced maneuverability and rapid response times.

COMMERCIAL VEHICLE ENFORCEMENT



The Commercial Vehicle Enforcement (CVE) unit ensures road safety by enforcing commercial vehicle regulations. CVE officers are trained in roadside inspection, weight enforcement, and hazardous materials handling. They patrol major thoroughfares and assist with incidents involving commercial vehicles. The unit collaborates with Texas DPS and trains officers from surrounding agencies.

The Auto Crimes Unit, also known as the Pasadena Auto Crimes Task Force (P.A.C.T.F.), is dedicated to fighting auto-related crimes in Pasadena. They employ a multi-faceted approach including reactive case work, data analysis, proactive and undercover investigations, enforcement of regulations, and public education. Their goal is to reduce or eliminate illegal activities related to stolen vehicles and parts. The unit actively investigates, arrests, and pursues prosecution of individuals involved in motor vehicle theft, parts theft, and vehicle burglaries.

We have seen great success in conducting undercover surveillance and apprehending violators in the act. The Gulf Coast Violent Offenders and Fugitive Task Force Pasadena Team is responsible for apprehending individuals with violent felony warrants within the Southern District, primarily focusing on those with a connection to Pasadena. Led by a Pasadena Police Department Sergeant, the team consists of officers and a Deputy U.S. Marshal. They have a track record of arresting violent offenders, including those wanted for capital murder, murder, and other serious offenses. They collaborate with other law enforcement agencies to locate fugitives and provide training to fellow officers on effective apprehension strategies.

The Criminal Investigation unit focuses on crimes involving minors under 17 years old, including cases referred by Children's Protective Services (CPS). They collaborate with CPS, handling criminal aspects while CPS addresses social and protective issues. The unit also manages the Sex Offender Registration Program, overseeing registration, verification, and compliance checks for registered offenders within their jurisdiction. Additionally, they provide advocacy and resources for high-risk youth and their families in Pasadena, with referrals coming from officers and investigators. Their work encompasses a range of responsibilities from investigation to offender management and youth support.

The Juvenile Sex Crimes Division, located at the Children's Assessment Center (CAC) in Houston, works collaboratively with various professionals to investigate juvenile sex crimes. Staffed by four investigators and a supervisor, the CAC's mission is to provide comprehensive, compassionate support for sexually abused children and their families. The unit also partners with the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force Program to address online crimes against children. This collaborative approach ensures a coordinated response to child sexual abuse cases, combining law enforcement efforts with medical, therapeutic, and child protection services.

The Violent Crimes Division (VCD) is a specialized unit responsible for investigating serious offenses such as assault, sexual assault, robbery, murder, and suspicious deaths. The division comprises a team of highly trained detectives who work diligently to apprehend perpetrators and build strong cases for prosecution.

The VCD's structure includes detectives stationed at the local office, as well as members assigned to specific roles such as cold case investigation, task force operations with federal agencies, and liaison work with other law enforcement units. This diverse team is supported by a dedicated crime and intelligence analyst.

The Crime Scene Unit performs a wide range of functions including crime scene processing, latent fingerprint analysis, arrest record management, event photography, drone operations, 3D scene scanning, evidence management and processing. They also provide training for crime scene courses. The unit plays a crucial role in major scene investigations, working alongside the Violent Crimes Division on cases ranging from complex burglaries to various types of death scenes. Their primary goal is to collaborate effectively with investigative units to ensure thorough scene processing and evidence collection. The unit is also available to assist other agencies when necessary. Their work is essential in maintaining the integrity of crime scenes and collecting vital evidence for investigations.

The Family Violence Unit investigates assaults, sexual assaults, terroristic threats, harassment, protective order violations, unlawful tracking device installations, and the unlawful disclosure of intimate visual materials. The unit also tracks and documents family violence crimes for the State of Texas and facilitates access to state-mandated victim support. The unit collaborated with the Crime Victim Liaison Division in the Texas Victim's Friendly Initiative, earning the "Gold Level Trauma Informed Agency" certification, one of only two police agencies in Texas to achieve this status in 2023.

CRIME VICTIM SERVICES

The Crime Victim Liaison Division consists of one full-time and one part-time Crime Victim Liaison (CVL). They provide essential support to crime victims through advocacy, education, and outreach, working with social service providers and legal entities in Harris County.

Services include liaison support with law enforcement, referrals to local agencies, personal advocacy, assistance with Crime Victims' Compensation Claims, and help obtaining Protective Orders. The division is dedicated to providing a safe reporting environment and handling investigations with a trauma-informed, collaborative approach, assisting victims regardless of their decision to pursue charges.



The Pasadena Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association is currently in its 30th year and was recognized by Chief Wright in February for this. Pasadena Citizens Police Academy Alumni brings together graduates of the Pasadena Citizen's Police Academy to enhance community-police relations and assist law enforcement agencies through programs that include providing assistance to officers and special events for officers and their families. The PCPAAA does this by holding several fundraisers each year to help purchase equipment for the police department on unbudgeted items, provide meals to officers and provide volunteer services. In 2023 the PCPAAA purchased one patrol drone and volunteered approximately 1500 hours of service.

QUALITY OF LIFE UNIT/COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT

The Quality of Life Division is dedicated to enhancing community well-being through proactive engagement and compassionate enforcement of laws and ordinances. This year, the division aimed to expand its impact by building strong relationships with other city departments, including Code Enforcement, Parks, Health, and City Marshals. Collaborative efforts have enabled the division to address various community concerns effectively. Additionally, partnerships with the Harris County Diversion Center and charity organizations like Families to Freedom have facilitated the relocation of homeless individuals in need of assistance.

The facility features classrooms, specialized training areas, and a fitness center. The academy is staffed by instructors, administrative personnel, and leadership roles. Under the academy's umbrella, the Les Early Firearms Training Center provides firearms training with dedicated range officers. The academy has conducted numerous in-service classes for both Pasadena Police Department employees and individuals from external agencies. Construction is underway on a state-of-the-art simunition house to enhance training for responding to critical incidents.
